## Listening for the Promise Weekly Devotional

## Second Sunday of Advent - December 4, 2022

"I baptize you with water for repentance, but he who is coming after me is mightier than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire." -Matthew 3:11

John the baptizer enters on the scene, preaching repentance to the Judean people. Last week we looked at how God promises to come to us again. Jesus urges us to be alert, be ready! John the baptizer warns his listeners to repent. John proclaimed that repentance is the proper way to prepare for that revelation. The only thing is that repentance is something that we cannot do. Just as Martin Luther wrote, "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ my lord or come to Him ..." Repentance, like faith, is a miracle that the Holy Spirit must work in us. John the baptizer proclaims the coming of Jesus; he points his listeners to Christ. John proclaims salvation in Jesus Christ, and that's another way we witness how God comes to us: through the proclomation and preaching of his holy Word. Before I was ordained as a Lutheran pastor, I suffered a terrible loss-- the loss of my mother. It was sudden and unexpected. I was 20 years old, a junior in college. I had another year and a half of my undergrad studies left before I would attend seminary. I knew God's promises, and I knew that my mother was a Christian with deep faith. I can't tell you exactly what the sermon was about at her funeral. I can't remember exactly every word spoken or every hug given. I can't even remember who all the people were that attended. But one thing I remember clearly, the most important message of all: my pastor reminding me of God's promises forgiveness, life, and salvation. A funeral pall was laid upon my mother's casket, reminding us of the gifts she received at her baptism. She was baptized into Christ's death and his resurrection. That image and message are forever engrained on my heart and mind. We need the proclamation of God's promises. It's the way he comes to us in the present time. Prayer: Gracious God, send us your messengers that we might dwell in your presence through your holy Word. In Jesus' name.
